After School Study

There has been a small change made to the system of supervised study this year. Owing to government guidelines on Covid-19, we have had to cap the number of students attending study to 24 students

per centre.



As a result of this, priority has been given to the Leaving Cert Junior Cert students to attend. The Leaving Cert centre has been set up in the Library while the

Junior Cert centre is in Room 4. There is also a new payment system in place via the Way to Pay system on the school website.

There will be a review after the Mid-term with the hope of adding additional students to the Junior Cert centre with the option of adding 2nd and 5th years.

As per usual, supervised study is available for students for 2 hours after school, Monday to Thursday inclusive. Students interested in after school study should speak to Mr. M. Trainor. It is our experience that students who avail of the after school study perform well in their exams, both house exams and State exams. Two hours work in after school study will usually take more than two hours to complete at home. After school study costs €12 for four evenings or €4 for one evening.





'Once again, the Men's Shed came up with a solution'. 'They are currently in the process of converting up to a hundred double desks into singles in order for us to be able to lay out our classrooms in a safe and socially distanced way'.

ASD Horticulture

The 1st and 2nd year ASD students are undertaking classes in Horticulture this year. They have spent the past two months working on an area in the corner of the staff car park, which was originally designed as a bee hotel by students Ross Walsh and Darragh McHugh in 2018, when they were part of Ms. Clinton's TY Science class. Unfortunately for Ross and Darragh, the school year finished before they could complete their work and in the subsequent year, the area was taken over by weeds, briars and grass again. This year, the ASD students began by removing all the weeds, briars and grass, digging and filling the soil into the area, adding four bags of organic compost and three bags of multipurpose compost, placing a weed block membrane on the ground and finally covering it with almost two tonnes of bark mulch. Over the coming months, the students will work with Mr. O'Brien to create trellis and with Ms. Murray to create a bottle cap mural for the area. For now, with the winter drawing close, the students in the Horticulture class will turn their attention to the glasshouse and soil experiments. Thanks to all involved, especially Horticulturist/ Caretaker Niall Leonard for all his advice.







St Joseph's Multi-Sensory Room
